The International Relations/Federal Government Committee has found an excellent venue to meet in the Linden House at 1250 Branchlands. Thanks to Lois Sandy this beautiful facility provides a place where we can meet regularly the second Wednesday of each month at no cost. The meetings are from 10:00 to 12:00. We had originally planned to discuss the judiciary in October. The national LWV office wants all chapters to examine issues pertaining to the national judiciary this year. We are fortunate to have a lawyer and interesting discussion leader on this subject with Diane Skalak. When *The Economist* published a timely article about what will happen if the election results are contested again, we asked Diane to postpone her presentation and she graciously agreed. **Her presentation on the judiciary will be on November 13th.** So we will look carefully at the problems and possible solutions that we will face if the Election is again challenged. The article is in the September 14th issue of *The Economist* (pp. 17-19). There are several weaknesses in our election system, but election officials are working hard to prepare for as many eventualities as possible. This is a very timely subject and we need to be cognizant of what could possibly happen. Please come and share your ideas with us.

IR/FG NEWS REPORT OF 9/11/24 MEETING by Gerry Kruger

Our committee met on the anniversary of the infamous terrorist attack on New York's World Trade Center. Lois Sandy arranged for us to meet at Linden House, but only Anita Pilling, Gerry Kruger, Carol Cutler, and Lois were present. Our chair Rice Wagner was sick.

Anita again led our discussion on Project 2025 and its impact on the economy if the Republican candidate (Donald Trump) wins the

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presidency.

Civil service employees in DC would no longer be protected by due process and collective bargaining rights. 80 % are African Americans and other minorities. Loyalty to Trump would be the only criteria for these positions. The President could hire and fire at will and eliminate government agencies as well.

Competitive examinations for positions would be eliminated. Only loyalists to Trump would fill them. The Department of Education would also be eliminated along with the FBI and Department of Homeland Security. The Department of Justice would be under the direction of the President.

The President would set interest rates, discredit the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, restore the gold standard, and allow banks to print their own money. The project envisions moving from an income tax to a national sales tax. It would also reduce individual income tax to two flat tax brackets and eliminate most credits, deductions, and exclusions. It would reduce the corporate tax rate, the capital gains rate for high earners, and require 3/5 vote in Congress to change tax rates. The plan would significantly increase taxes for millions of low and middle-income households. The Congressional Budget Office says these policies would add \$3.5 trillion to the nation's deficit. Finally, the plan would end taxes on drug manufacturers that force them to comply with Medicare price controls.

Project 2025 would eliminate the Department of Commerce and impose tariffs on most imports from all countries. These measures could set off a global trade war and accelerate inflation. This would raise prices on consumer products, which hurt low and middle-income households. These elevated prices could slow economic growth.

The project proposes to abolish the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau and the FTC, shrink the role of the National Labor Relations Board, abolish the Economic Development Association, decrease overtime pay, require Americans to be paid more for working on Sunday, and diminish child labor protections.

Immigration deportations will greatly damage the American economy. The Pew Research Center reports 10.5 million undocumented immigrants in the US, but Trump claims 15-20 million will be quickly deported. He would have red state National Guards, local police, sheriffs, and other enforcement officers arresting immigrants in large-scale raids. Those arrested would be held in internment camps at the cost of \$1400/month for each detainee. The cost of this plan is thought to be in the billions.

Funding for the border wall with Mexico would increase dramatically. Protections for the Dream Act would end. Economists warn that these measures would cause a rapid rise in unemployment and inflation,

especially in industries like hospitality, agriculture, construction, and care for the young and elderly. One million have jobs providing professional, scientific, technical, and administrative services.

Besides causing unemployment problems, property values would drop, rental properties would be empty, and the billions they pay in taxes as well as their contributions to Social Security (though they're not eligible for benefits) would be lost.
